un•com•fort•a•ble—uhn-CUHM-fert-uh-buhl *adjective* not feeling or giving comfort

un•like•ly—uhn-LIK-lee *adjective* not likely to happen

un•u•su•al—uhn-YOO-zhoo-uhl *adjective* not common, rare

un•wise—uhn-WIZ *adjective* not wise, foolish

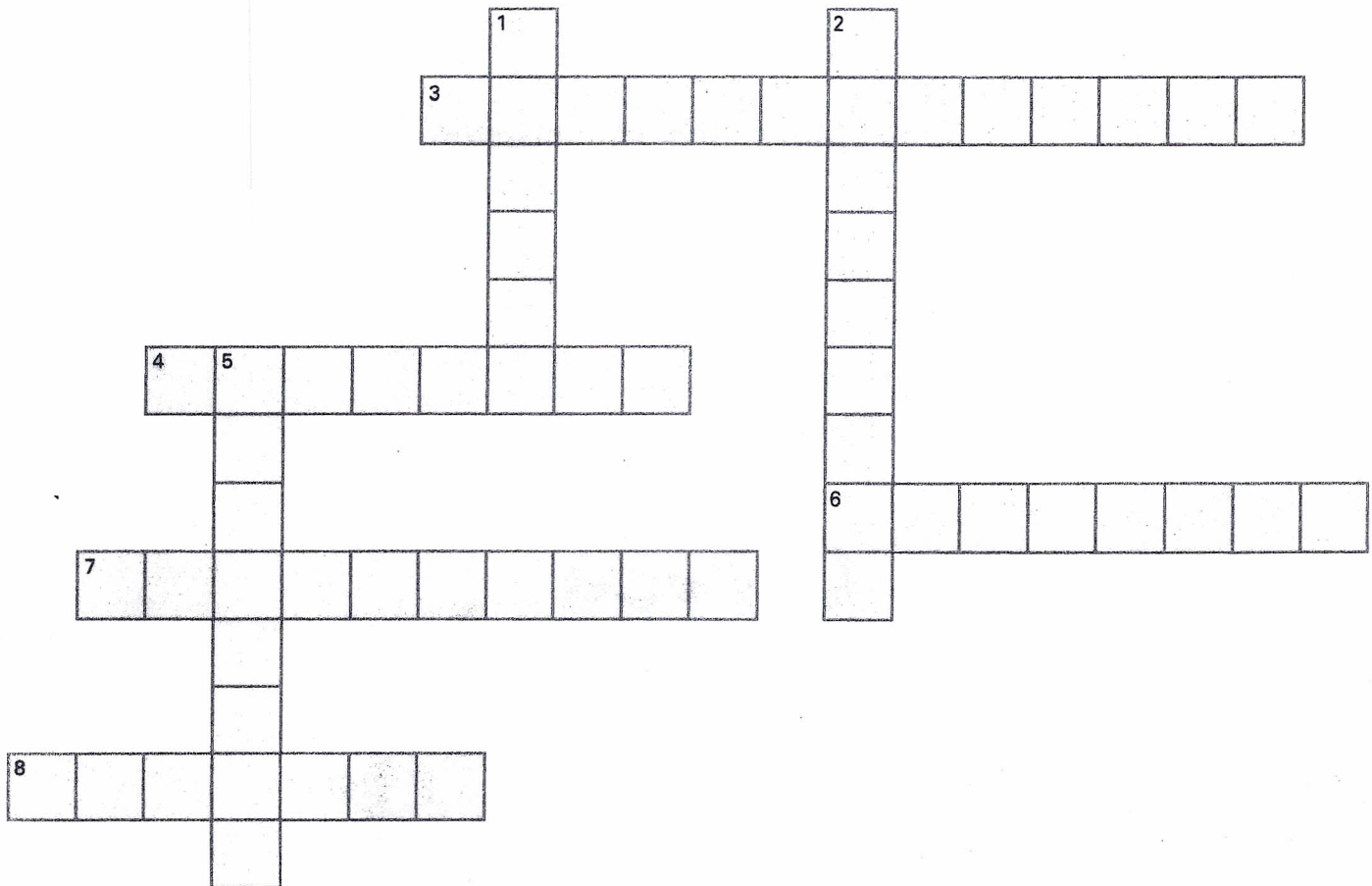
